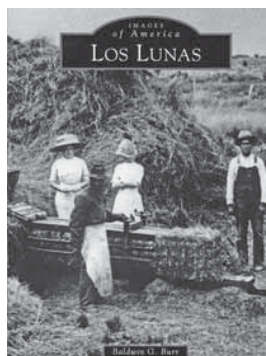

Village "Holding Its Own" As New Budget Year Starts

The first of July starts the budget year for New Mexico municipalities including Los Lunas. Although gross receipts tax revenue is down five percent over all, Village Administrator Gregory Martin says the village is "holding its own" in the midst of a still-recovering economy.

During the 2012-13 budget year the village will maintain services as well as have a substantial reserve in the General Fund.

Municipal governments in New Mexico must retain a reserve equal to one-twelfth of General Fund expenses, and the village's reserve is several times that number. The reserve is important in case a government entity's revenues come in under projections.

Next year's budget allocates funding to exterior site improvements to the administration building such as landscaping and reshaping the parking lots, the branding campaign, and investing in property for the new corridor between I-25 and Highway 47, as well as Transportation Center building and other miscellaneous improvements.

Another expense may be expanding the village's wastewater system which operates near capacity after the state prison connected to the system.

The village will continue its level of service offering 17 community and neighborhood parks, extensive public library hours, a multi-faceted recreation program, and cultural programs that include the Museum of Heritage and Arts.

Gross receipts tax revenue accounts for more than fifty percent of the village's general fund income so shopping in Los Lunas continues to be important. Administrator Martin points out it is easy to shop in Los Lunas because the village now has many stores.

Lieutenant Graduates From FBI Academy

Lieutenant Naithan Gurule graduated from the Federal Bureau of Investigation National Police Academy (FBINA) and is the first graduate of the academy in the history of the Los Lunas Police Department.

The FBINA is an extensive eleven week academic and physical fitness program where future law enforcement executive management leaders are developed.

Two New Police Officers on the Streets

Los Lunas Police Officers Jeremy Shaw and Buster Whitley graduated from the New Mexico Department of Public Safety Police Academy on June 1. Both officers have been assigned to field training officers in the department and will complete an extensive 12-week field training program before being assigned to their own patrol units.

The officers were hired under a COPS grant where the village will receive \$391,934 to fully fund the officers' wages and benefits for three years.

Carson Drive Improvements

The village council awarded G. Sandoval Inc. the contract to make improvements to Carson Drive between De Vargas Court and Pine Court. The contract was for \$194,885.

The work includes rebuilding the street, and the water structure under the street if necessary, creating curbs and gutters as well as pedestrian refuge islands on Carson Drive, and providing handicapped ramps.

Funding for the project is from the Municipal Arterial Program which is referred to as MAP.

Don't Create Trash!
Recycle At The Village
Recycling Center

The village's recycling center is a clean and efficient way to stop producing trash.

Located at 197 Don Pasqual Road, behind the Village Administration Building and the Senior Center, the recycling center is open 24 hours seven days a week.

Someone works with the recycling Monday through Friday 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. and an employee helps keep the center clean and operational over the weekends.

Here's what you can drop off at the Recycling Center:

- Cardboard (please break down)
- Plastics of all kinds -- numbers one to six
- Newspapers, magazines, books, phone books and other papers
- Aluminum and tin
- All metal washers, driers, refrigerators, water heaters and stoves
- Computers and all electrical devices including phones, laptops, radios, etc.

*Televisions (there is a charge of \$15 per television)
