Parks, Recreation & Streets Dept. Earns Matanza Awards

The Village's Parks, Recreation and Streets Department earned third place in Carne Adovado and Specialty Item and second place in Chicharrones at the Valencia County Hispano Chamber of Commerce Matanza held the last Saturday in February.

The event drew an estimated 19,000 people to enjoy the food and camaraderie.

Village employees who helped at the department's booth during the Matanza were Herman Garcia, park supervisor; Pat Jaramillo, park ranger; Jason Duran, operation manager; Captain John Gabaldon, Los Lunas Fire Department; Jeralyn Duran, recreation aide; Chris Gomez, facility attendant; Michael Jaramillo, Director of Parks Recreation and Streets; Peter Fernandez; village administrator; and Christine Nardi, human resources manager.

In addition, ten family and friends of the people listed helped at the booth where three pigs were processed. The team was one of the last to stop cooking and only stopped because supplies ran out.

Michael Jaramillo said that participating in the Matanza shows support of the preservation of Hispanic culture and scholarship opportunities for graduating seniors in Valencia County.

He pointed out that putting a team together for the Matanza promoted unity within the department which extended to other people at the village.

Jaramillo thanked all the friends and family members for their support as well as their knowledge and expertise in cooking the pigs. He said the awards would not have been possible without their help.

Wasting Water Prohibited

From April 1 through September 30 spray irrigation is allowed in Los Lunas from 6 p.m. to 10 a.m. on all properties.

Shut-off nozzles in the village are required on any hoses used for hand watering, vehicle or equipment washing or other outdoor uses.

One Vote Elects Perea to Council; Saiz returns

On the election night of Tuesday, March 6, results showed Amanda M. Perea elected to the Los Lunas village council by 133 votes compared to her opponent Helen Y. Cole's 132 votes.

Incumbent village councilor Gerard Saiz ran unopposed and was re-elected with 97 votes.

Cecilia CC Castillo, a village councilor since 2000, retired from that position this month. She was first elected before the districting of the council when she was elected by those who voted in the entire village.

After the council was districted when the 2000 Census showed the village had over 10,000 population, Castillo was elected to the council in 2004 and 2008 from a district.

Main Street Sidewalks Being Replaced

The replacement of the sidewalks on Main Street between Los Cerritos and Los Lentes is now occurring and is expected to last until sometime in May.

The goal of the \$315,000 project is to increase pedestrian and American Disabilities Act accessibility by replacing driveways, installing new driveways, and removing/replacing sidewalks as well as other miscellaneous construction work.

Lane closures will be kept to a minimum and work will primarily occur during non-peak hours of traffic.

The contractor for the project is G. Sandoval Construction who is working with the New Mexico Department of Transportation as well as the village because Main Street is a state highway.

Fix A Leak in Your Home or Business to Save Money and Commemorate Fix a Leak Week

Spring will be here this month and what better way to celebrate the arrival of the new season then to check your faucets for leaks.

According to the Environmental Protection Agency, minor water leaks account for more than one trillion gallons of water wasted each year in U. S homes. The EPA declared March 12 through 18 as Fix a Leak Week, but leaks should be dealt with immediately no matter when they occur.

Here's some facts on leaks by the EPA:

- Average household leaks can account for more than 10,000 gallons of water wasted every year, or enough water to wash almost ten months' laundry.

- Household leaks can waste more than one trillion gallons annually nationwide which is enough water to supply Arizona, Utah, Colorado and New Mexico for more than a year.

- Ten percent of homes have leaks that waste 90 gallons or more per day.

- Leaks found in the home include worn toilet flappers, dripping faucets and leaking shower heads. All are easily remedied.

- Fixing an easily corrected household water leak can save more than ten percent on water bills.

- If you keep your home leak free by repairing leaks immediately then fixture replacement parts may not require a major investment.

- Most common leaks can be eliminated after retrofitting with high efficiency appliances.

How can a leak be detected?

- A good method to check for leaks is to examine winter water use for households. A family of four probably has a serious leak problem if the winter water use exceeds 12,000 gallons per month.

- Check water meters before and after a two-hour



period when no water is being used. If the meter does not read exactly the same, a leak probably exists.

- One way to discover a toilet leak is to place a drop of food coloring in the toilet tank. If the color shows up in the bowl within 15 minutes without flushing then there is a leak. Be sure to flush immediately after this experiment to avoid staining the tank.

Faucets and Shower Heads

A leaky faucet that drips at the rate of one drip per second can waste more than 3,000 gallons a year. A home with WaterSense labeled toilets can use that water to flush for six months.

- Leaky faucets can be fixed by checking faucet washers and gaskets and replacing them if necessary with more efficient appliances.

Scavenging Prohibited and Dangerous

Village Ordinances prohibit scavenging saying "it is unlawful for any person not authorized by the village or the designated user of a trash container to remove, collect or disturb the trash stored in such container or to open the lid intending to do so. No person shall remove any trash from a container and scatter the same upon any public or private property."

And speaking of scavenging, no one should go through the items being recycled at the village's recycling center. It is dangerous and not healthy.

Ten Help in March Cleanup

Ten people helped clean up Los Lunas the beginning of March working on the Sun Ranch and Los Morros areas. Fifty bags of trash were collected with village employees Adolph Lopez and Mark Leeder helping.

Using the branding research compiled during Phase One of the project, I made a presentation called "Los Lunas is a Place..." to Village Councilors and local residents on Feb. 23. At the time I shared initial Phase Two branding elements which included a draft of Los Lunas' brand essence, positioning, possible slogans, and a dozen brand truisms (or promises) of what the Village stands for and can offer to its residents, businesses and visitors.

This information will soon be posted on the Village's website www.loslunasnm.gov and also displayed in the lobby of the village administration building, but a few of the branding ideas are showcased here.

Los Lunas Brand Essence:

- Welcome to a community poised for greatness and prosperity where residents, businesses and local leaders share a common vision for desired growth and a quality of life second-to-none.

- Embracing its future with great anticipation, Los Lunas is a small community with very big possibilities.
