

Construction to Start on Medical Center in LL; Efforts for County Mill Levy Will Continue

Construction is expected to start in summer 2014 with an opening date of winter 2015 for the Valencia Regional Medical Center (VRMC) on the west side of the Village of Los Lunas.

In the meantime, people are being encouraged to continue their efforts to contact the Valencia County Commission to express their support for allocating the mill levy collected since 2007 to the facility in Los Lunas.

Darin Miller of Miller Development + Architecture has announced that he and his company intend to proceed with the development in Los Lunas of "a hospital that will initially not require mill levy support, but which will qualify for that support under the standards set in the Hospital Funding Act."

Allocation of the mill levy funds to VRMC in Los Lunas would result in a facility with more services including birthing services and satellite services in the county.

Miller said his company will work with Lovelace Health System on reviewing the studies done in the area about medical and hospital care to map out construction without mill levy support. But he emphasized that the facility would provide more services for the community's medical needs with the mill levy support.

Lovelace Health System has agreed to manage the new facility and its programs. According to the Lovelace website, Lovelace Health System began in the 1880s, when missionaries and philanthropists from the Midwest extended their mission of caring to Albuquerque. In 1901 they built a hospital and a year later opened a sanitarium to care for the growing ranks of tuberculosis patients seeking health in the high, dry air.

In 2006 Valencia County voters approved a mill levy to support a medical facility in the county. The mill levy funds are controlled by the Valencia County Commission.

None of these funds have been spent on any medical facility in the county although the money has been collected since 2007.

The full \$55 million VCMR project would be 110,000 square feet with 85,000 square feet for a hospital and 25,000 square feet of clinic space. It is projected the full hospital project would create 500 local construction jobs and 450 full-time medical jobs. The hospital budget is estimated at \$40 million a year, including \$14 million for salaries and benefits.

Recycling Event Helps Clean Up Los Lunas

April's Great American Recycling Event, sponsored by Keep Los Lunas Clean & Beautiful in conjunction with the Village's Solid Waste Department, proved a great success with 219 vehicles coming through carrying recyclables. Items collected included:

- 2,660 pounds of metal; 1.33 tons;
- 226 gallons of assorted paints;
- 2,210 pounds of glass bottles resulting in 1.10 tons of ground glass;
- 50 gallons of used oil;
- Ten four-yard bins of cardboard resulting in three bales;
- Four four-yard bins of plastic resulting in one bale; and
- 49 assorted televisions and 31 assorted CRT monitors which New Mexico Computer Recyclers collected at the event.

Cleanup Coordinator Marie Marquez thanked all the people who helped including staff and volunteers. She also thanked Village citizens who take recycling seriously enough to make and keep our environment cleaner and safer in Los Lunas.

Lunch was provided to all working staff.

Seventy Pounds of Medication Collected

The Los Lunas Police Department, partnering with the United States Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) National Take Back Initiative, collected approximately seventy pounds of prescription medication on the last Saturday of April..

Two sites were available for people to drop off unused medication: the Los Lunas Police Department and Smith's Food and Drug, both open for four hours.

People were encouraged to bring any and all unused prescription medication in their possession. The service was free and anonymous. Officers did not ask questions or log any information.

According to the DEA, the purpose of the National Take Back Program is to reduce the amount of drug abuse through prescription drugs. The unused medications were turned over to the DEA.

Police Officers Implement New Village Programs

The Village's Community Policing Officers have started two new programs — "Partnering with the Los Lunas Police Department" and "Business Check" cards.

In the "Partnering with the Los Lunas Police Department" program residents and businesses are given a decal for their homes and store fronts, visible to the public. Participants receive monthly e-mail notifications titled "updates" which contains helpful information. The program goal is a partnership between the community and the department.

Village police officers will conduct checks of Los Lunas businesses during open hours and after hours for the "Business Check" program. Officers will build relationships with business owners and their customers while at the establishment. After hours officers will walk around the business, checking doors and windows. If the officer finds an issue of concern, the officer will write a note on the back of a business card requesting a call or e-mail back so the officer can relay the issue of concern to the business owner.

Police Chief Roy E. Melnick says, "Our officers have implemented these new programs and received very positive feedback. The police department's partnership with the community will help build relationships, solve problems, and make a difference."

Los Lunas Library Offers Online Language Learning

Los Lunas Public Library now offers the Mango Languages online language-learning system, announced Library Director Cynthia J. Shetter.
