FACEBOOK OPENS FIRST BUILDING

Facebook has opened its \$1 billion data center in Los Lunas with the opening of the first building of what will eventually be six.

The Village site is now serving traffic as part of Facebook's global network of hyper-efficient data centers.

The company expects to complete construction on five additional buildings, with about 300 employees, by the end of 2023. When finished, the facility will form two H shapes on a 2.8-million-square-foot campus and will contain a total of 22 "data halls" of servers and related equipment.

Facebook has signed commitments to add 396 megawatts of green energy to the state's electric grid through wind and solar projects. The company estimates the projects will result in an investment of more than \$800 million.

The projects include a solar array near the data center, two new wind farms in Torrance, Quay and De Baca counties, and solar facilities in Cibola, Sandoval and Torrance counties.

The data center broke ground in October 2016.

When the first building opened, Facebook had used 128,000 cubic yards of concrete, 14,600 tons of steel and 4,572 miles of wire. More than 1,100 workers have been on-site each day.

Facebook plans to award Community Action grants that support organizations and initiatives that help to connect the community and increase digital skills.

MUNOZ SELECTED FOR COUNCIL

Cruz Munoz has been sworn in as Village Councilor for District 3 of the Los Lunas Village Council.

District 3 had been represented by Gerard Saiz who was elected to the Valencia County Commission in November 2018. Saiz was sworn in to the County Commission Jan. 1, 2019, and resigned his seat on the Village Council effective the end of January.

Munoz was selected for District 3 at the Feb. 21, 2019, Village Council meeting and took office after being sworn in Feb. 28, 2019.

POOL TO BE DEMOLISHED

The swimming pool located near Los Lunas High School has been closed by the Los Lunas Board of Education and will be demolished.

Built in 1983, the pool has deteriorated to a point where it can no longer be repaired for use.

LLPD DWI UNIT

The Los Lunas Police Department made 111 arrests for impaired driving in 2018, slightly above 2017's number of 104.

LLPD implemented a DWI unit in July 2016. Since its inauguration, the LLPD has seen an overall increase of 76.19 percent in DWI arrests.

The LLPD DWI unit was created to specialize in the detection, investigation, and arrest of alcohol and/or drug impaired drivers. The unit consists of two officers trained in the field of investigating impaired driving. The officers are certified Drug Recognition Experts.

The DWI unit officers assist other officers with DWI investigations providing an invaluable resource to the patrol division. The DWI unit analyzes state and department data to determine patterns and locations of impaired-driving-related incidents to effectively plan enforcement.

MUSEUM HOSTS AYER, HOY Y MANANA

On display through May 3 at the Los Lunas Museum of Heritage & Arts is Ayer, Hoy, y Mañana – Yesterday, Today, and Tomorrow, an exhibition of traditional and contemporary Hispanic arts.

New Mexico's culturally rich heritage of creating vernacular art to adorn churches, private chapels, and residences began in the early years of the Spanish-Colonial era and was firmly entrenched by the mid-Eighteenth Century. The advent of an artisan class, known as santeros, depicted religious iconography to celebrate their Christianity.

Rooted in this folk-art tradition, Hispanic folk artists of today honor these origins, reinterpret traditional subject matter, and revitalize age-old techniques to create woodcarvings, tinwork, colchas, straw appliqué, furniture, weavings, jewelry, pottery, ironwork, and more.

Ayer, Hoy, y Mañana – Yesterday, Today, and Tomorrow celebrates this heritage with the work of more than sixty santeros and artisans, many of whom have participated in Santa Fe's Spanish Market and have exhibited in museums in the United States and abroad.

On April 11, Tim Lucero, Roxanne Shaw Galindo, Nicolás Otero, and Gabriel Vigil will discuss their respective works in a panel discussion at the Los Lunas Museum of Heritage & Arts from 6 to 7:30 p.m.
