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2021 FACEBOOK COMMUNITY ACTION GRANTS

The 2021 Facebook Community Action Grants recipients have been announced.

The Facebook Community Action Grants program was created to address needs in Valencia County by putting the power of technology to use for community benefit, connecting people online or off, and improving STEM education.

Facebook has committed to building strong partnerships within the community, and embracing the opportunity to have a positive local impact.

Congratulations to these exceptional organizations, and many thanks to all who applied!

2021 Facebook Los Lunas Data Center Community Action Grants Recipients:

- All for Animals \$22,820 supports upgraded field technology for animal control officers serving Valencia County.
- Belen Public Library \$9,900 funds virtual and hybrid programming to support the community's use of technology for education, career readiness, and daily life.
- CASA Partners 4NMKids \$10,000 supports Chromebooks accessible to volunteers and CASA foster children.
- Community Wellness Council \$10,000 supports the Council's Resource Connector, a program designed to use technology to address community mental health issues..
- Explora Science Center & Children's Museum of Albuquerque \$7,500 supports Explora's Community Science program, providing underserved and diverse pre-K to 8th grade Valencia County students with experiential STEAM learning.

WATCH FOR CHILD ABUSE

April was National Child Abuse month but every month is a time to fight child abuse.

Here's important information in a state where child abuse rates are very high, points out Village Police Chief Naithan Gurule.

Know what child abuse is:

- Physical and sexual abuse clearly constitute maltreatment, but so does neglect, or the failure of parents or other caregivers to provide a child with needed food, clothing, and care.
- Children can also be emotionally abused when they are rejected, berated, or continuously isolated.

Domestic Violence is child abuse:

- Depression, fear of a certain adult, difficulty trusting others or making friends, sudden changes in eating or sleeping patterns, inappropriate sexual behavior, poor hygiene, secrecy, and hostility are often signs of family problems and may indicate a child is being neglected or physically, sexually, or emotionally abused.
- Keep your children healthy. Denying children food, sleep, or healthcare is abuse by neglect.

VILLAGE FIRE DEPARTMENT

Another in a continuing series about departments in the Village,

The Village of Los Lunas Fire and Emergency Medical Services Department provides 24-hour service with paid and volunteer personnel to ensure the safety and peace for a good quality of life in the Village.

Services provided include public fire education for the children of the school district and other groups upon request.

The department provides a fire prevention program conducting inspections on new and existing commercial buildings as well as apartment and residential buildings.

RENTAL, UTILITY ASSISTANCE

The State of New Mexico is granting \$170M of federal aid to New Mexicans for rental and utility assistance to households experiencing financial hardship due to the COVID-19 outbreak.

The rental assistance and utility assistance program will take applications starting April 5, 2021 through August 2021.

Renters across the state are eligible for the program -- except for residents of Bernalillo County, Dona Ana County, and those who live in a pueblo or tribal area. Those two counties, as well as tribal governments, will administer their own Rental Assistance Programs.

Those seeking assistance should review the current FAQ at www.RentHelpNM.org to learn more about eligibility and documentation needed for their application. The help desk phone number is 1 833 485-1334.

The State of New Mexico will either pay the landlord and/or the utility provider directly depending on the financial assistance request by the applicant.

Landlords and utility providers are encouraged to download a W9 and submit it to DFA via ERAVendor.Relations@state.nm.us as soon as possible to ensure a streamlined process for receiving payment.

LITERACY VOLUNTEERS STILL NEEDED

The Valencia County Literacy Council still needs volunteer tutors.

Subjects to be tutored include Early Literacy (zero to five years), Adult Basic Literacy, and English as a Second Language (not required to be bilingual).

Volunteer requirements include being 18-years old; ability to read, write and speak English; able to tutor students two to three hours a week; and able to plan and prepare for tutoring sessions,



THINGS TO REMEMBER WHEN WALKING

Walk on the sidewalk if there is one, points out Village Police Chief Naithan Gurule.

If no sidewalk, walk facing traffic. If there is no sidewalk and you must walk on the road, be sure to walk facing traffic.

Be safe. Be seen. Brightly colored clothing makes it easier for drivers to see you during the daytime.

At night, you need a flashlight or special reflective material on your shoes, cap, and jacket or on your arms or legs that bounce the car's lights off you and back to the driver.

This light should caution the driver that there is something or someone moving and they should slow down and be careful.

Darting out in front of a parked car is dangerous. The driver of the car coming down the street can't see you!
