HOSPITAL IN LOS LUNAS

On April 24, the Valencia County Commission approved a trio of agreements that hopefully portend the construction of a hospital that will serve Valencia County residents as well as others.

The county commissioners voted 4-0 to award a healthcare facilities contract to Brazos — a joint venture between Texas-based Community Healthcare Corporation (CHC) and Albuquerque's Lovelace Health System — for the operation of a Valencia County hospital.

The commissioners also approved a design-build contract with Albuquerque-based construction company Bradbury Stamm and its design partner FBT Architects, also out of Albuquerque. The facility will be built on the northeast corner of NM HWY 6 and Sand Sage, west of Interstate 25. The property is southeast of Los Lunas Fire Station 2 on Sand Sage Street.

In a joint statement issued by CHC and Lovelace, the companies indicated the hospital will be owned by Valencia County and operated by a joint venture of the two companies.

Funds for the operation and maintenance of a hospital were collected from county taxpayers in the form of a property tax — an eight-year mill levy that was approved by voters in November 2006 and collected from 2007 to 2014.

Valencia County officials report that collections total about \$28 million and those funds are kept in an interest-bearing account at Bank of the West.

THE VILLAGE'S FINANCE & INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY DEPARTMENTS

The Village's newly created Annual Report is designed as a communications tool revealing how the Village and its devoted teams are committed to transparency and accountability.

The Village is devoting sections of this newsletter to the Annual Report so people better understand how the Village works.

FINANCE DEPARTMENT

The Finance Department works to support Village staff and internal operations by providing oversight of revenue received by the Village. The Finance Department has:

- Obtained an unmodified or "clean" audit opinion from an external audit firm.
- Received recognition by the New Mexico State Auditor, Joseph M. Maestas for the Best Overall Audit by a Large Municipality.
- Provided oversight for 31 individual funds, to include budgeting, monitoring expenditures, and fulfillment of related reporting requirements.
- Processed over \$45 million of vendor invoices.

The Finance Department provides the best possible stewardship over the revenue received by the Village.

This is achieved through the preparation and monitoring of the annual budget, the production of timely financial reports, oversight of the procurement process, and timely payments to vendors.

In 2023, the Village began to make expenditures towards the largest capital project in the Village's history, the I-25 Second Interchange/Los Lunas Boulevard project which requires regular oversight by Finance.

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY (IT)

The IT Department oversees technology, equipment and software for the Village, coordinating regular service and compliance with cybersecurity. IT has:

- Processed 866 Internal Service Requests, 210 of which were high priority.
- Supported 539 End-User devices: 321 Windows, 207 iOS, and 11 Android.
- Supported 38 software systems, 21 of which are managed in the cloud.
- Provided cybersecurity awareness training to reduce the number of phish-prone employees.

The Village had an impressively low 4.4% of phish-prone employees compared to the government industry benchmark of 16%.

Information Technology has grown significantly over the past two years to serve the technology needs of a growing community and the increased cybersecurity risks worldwide.

In 2023, IT focused on server upgrades, both replacing on-premises servers that were beyond their service life, and transitioning software and services to a cloud-based environment.

Cybersecurity has also been a major focus.

A new Core Security Gateway was implemented, as well as a Cyber Security Program with dashboards and prevention strategies.

THINGS TO REMEMBER WHEN WALKING

Summer mornings can be a perfect time to walk in the Village, but safety needs to be a prime consideration when walking.

Walk on the sidewalk if there is one, say Los Lunas Police officers.

If no sidewalk, walk facing traffic. If there is no sidewalk and you must walk on the road, be sure to walk facing traffic.

Be safe. Be seen. Brightly colored clothing makes it easier for drivers to see you during the daytime.

At night, you need a flashlight or special reflective material on your shoes, cap, and jacket or on your arms or legs that bounce the car's lights off you and back to the driver.

This light should caution the driver that there is something or someone moving and they should slow down and be careful.

Remember that those coming down the street can't always see you!

A BIT OF LOS LUNAS HISTORY

"A Cultural & Economic History of Los Lunas" was written by Los Lunas Library and Museum Director Cynthia Shetter and can be found on the Village's website loslunasnm.gov. This newsletter is running excerpts from Shetter's writing.

In 1946, shortly after World War II ended, future Mayor Howard C. Simpson and his family moved to Peralta. There, they established a chile farm. He worked on the farm until he suffered a heart attack. After recovering, he went to work for the Zuni Milling Co. in Los Lunas which milled fluorspar.

The mill was built in 1942 by the Defense Plant Corporation as part of the war industry during World War II. The mill was situated on a straight spur about 200 yards off the line of the Santa Fe Railway just south of the present-day transportation center. Fluorspar played a very active part in the production of atomic energy in the nuclear age; it is also used as a flux in steel making. The flotation plant made its initial production in March 1943 and was the largest producer of fluorspar in New Mexico in 1943.

Most of the concentrates were shipped to hydrofluoric-acid plants, but some were shipped to the Government stock pile at East St. Louis, Illinois, and to glass plants. The mill feed was supplied by the Navajo mine in western Valencia County (now Cibola) near Grants. In addition to supplying milling ore to the flotation plant, the Navajo mine shipped 7,700 tons of fluxing-gravel fluorspar. The Navajo mine was acquired during the latter part of 1943 by the Shattuck Denn Mining Corporation, that also took over management of the flotation plant at Los Lunas in 1944 and operated it until it closed in 1953.

After the plant closed, Simpson relocated to Sandoval Road in Los Lunas and began working with Lloyd Ball, who owned a gas station on Main Street, just east of Los Lentes Road, currently the property of the Range Café. Along with Felix Baca, he drove a truck for Ball. Eventually he bought the truck and started his own company. Known as Hub Oil, Simpson's company provided gasoline to service stations from Albuquerque to Socorro, with two retail outlets in Los Lunas and El Cerro.

By 1960, the population had risen to 1,186 and Simpson was induced to run for mayor. In 1962, he narrowly edged out Fred Huning, Jr. in a close election. Even though he beat Huning, Mayor Simpson collaborated with Huning on local residential and commercial development. Together they were both instrumental in the Interstate 25 project that brought the freeway to the west side of Los Lunas. During his three terms as Mayor of Los Lunas, Simpson pioneered the first sewer plant to be built in the country under the Federal Accelerated Public Works Program, initiated plans for a new bridge over the Rio Grande, oversaw the adoption of the Village's first comprehensive plan, zoning ordinances, and subdivision regulations.
