## KING OF THE HILL IN LOS LUNAS

In the 10k ruck sack top three in the men's division were Clifford Matthews, Albuquerque; Steven Apodaca, Los Lunas; Gabriel Barela, Los Lunas; with the women's division winners Vickie Yarnes, Rio Rancho; Demetria Vasquez, Albuquerque; and Monica Padilla, Albuquerque.

In the men's half marathon Jeff Cuno, Albuquerque; Ean Elias, Peralta; and Benjamin Flaata, Albuquerque; finished up front and the women were Greta Rickenauer, Albuquerque; Kristen Yarnel, Socorro; and Valerie Hermanson, Albuquerque.

King of the Hill offers 100% trail running at 5k, 10k, and half marathon distances.

The races took place on the beautiful and challenging trails of El Cerro de Los Lunas Preserve.

The courses feature beautiful views and large elevation changes on the 10k and half marathon courses. The event grows every year.

## VILLAGE ADMINISTRATION

*The Village produces an annual report filled with handy information about what is occurring throughout the community and Village offices.*

*This month we have the first half of a two-part series about the Village administration.*

The Administration Department includes the functions of the Village Administrator, Municipal Clerk, and Economic Development.

The Department provides strategic oversight for Village operations, interfaces with the business community for economic development, coordinates Village Council meetings, and manages public records and information.

A key function of the Administration Department is to track progress on Village Council Strategic Priorities, which are updated every four years.

In 2024, the Village made notable progress on current Council Strategic Priorities, which include the I-25 Second Interchange and Los Lunas Boulevard Project, Quality of Life Improvements, Infrastructure Improvements, and Economic Development.

The Village obtained all required environmental clearances and certifications and secured funding to move forward with bidding and advertising Phase I of the Los Lunas Boulevard project, for which a bid award and construction is expected to begin in spring 2025.

To advance two specific needed and desired quality of life improvement projects, the Village completed a Needs Analysis for a future Indoor Aquatic Center, including a cost analysis and conceptual design, with extensive public input and participation, and completed a preliminary design of a new Public Library.

The Village is currently seeking funding for both the proposed Indoor Aquatic Center and new Public Library to make these facilities a reality.

In terms of Village infrastructure, in 2024, the Village made significant progress towards creating multimodal transportation opportunities throughout the community by completing two bicycle and pedestrian pathway improvement projects: NM 314 from Romeroville Road to Griego Road and South Los Lentes from Aspen Road to Morris Road.

Finally, the Village continued its efforts to support economic development throughout the Village by including a Main Street Overlay in the zoning code update to support economic development by presenting tools to support affordable housing development, including downpayment assistance update to support a thriving business district on Main Street programs and direct investment in qualified projects.

## CHILD ABUSE PREVENTION WALK

The Family Resource Center in Los Lunas is sponsoring a 'Walk Down Main Street for Child Abuse Prevention (CAP)' Saturday, April 26, from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m.

The event kicks off at YDI – Family Resource Center at 428 Los Lentes Rd. SE, and ends at Daniel Fernandez Park, for a walk of 1.5 miles.

The first 150 attendees receive a free cap which goes with the event's slogan, Let's Put a Cap on Drug Abuse.

Hamburgers and hot dogs will be available for participants.

# A BIT OF LOS LUNAS HISTORY

## CONCLUDING OUR SERIES

### Charles Griego (Born 1951) Served as Mayor 2014 - Present

Charles Griego was born on July 12, 1951, in Los Lentes to Ramon and Juanita Perea Griego.

A life-long resident of Los Lunas, Charles is a graduate of the University of New Mexico, where he was conferred a Bachelor of Arts in History.

In 1984, he became the manager of Heritage Title of Valencia County, a company he currently owns and operates.

He is married to Angela Griego née Carabajal of Los Lunas; and they have two children Charles Joseph Griego and Ana Emilia Van de Putte.

His career in public service began in 1982 upon his election to the Village Council.

As the Village's population increased throughout the 1990s, the community was partitioned into four council districts in 2000, and Charles represented District 2 until 2014.

After thirty-two years as a councilman, he was elected the 11th Mayor of Los Lunas in March 2014.

During his first term in office, the Village experienced considerable growth, which necessitated long-range land-use, water conservation, transportation, and wastewater plans.

With the announcement by the social media company Facebook (now Meta) in 2016 of a data center in Los Lunas, the Village regained some of its national recognition that had been diminished when U.S. Route 66 was realigned through Albuquerque in 1937.

Charles continues to serve as Mayor of Los Lunas, having been elected to a second term in March 2018 and third in November 2023.

In the more than nine decades since Los Lunas incorporated as a Village, many changes have occurred in the once-sleepy town along the banks of the Rio Grande.

Eleven men with deep local roots have guided and managed the Village's growth, a process which continues under the leadership of Mayor Griego.
