BUSINESS REGISTRATION

THE SPLASH PAD IS OPEN

The Los Lunas splash pad is now open to the public at Daniel Fernandez Memorial Park.

The splash pad is open 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday, closed Sunday and Monday. No reservations are needed.

Entrance into the splash pad will be on a first come first serve basis. Maximum capacity for the pad is 75 people. There is no attendant on duty and adult supervision of children is required.

The splash pad closes on Labor Day, Monday, September 1.

VILLAGE OF LOS LUNAS HUMAN RESOURCES DEPARTMENT

The Village produces an annual report filled with handy information about what is occurring throughout the community and Village offices.

Over the next months the Village newsletter will run excerpts from that 2024 Annual Report which is available on the Village website loslunasnm.gov.

Human resources focuses on attracting well-qualified diverse candidates who are committed to providing outstanding customer service and exceptional work.

The Human Resources Department works to recruit and retain a skilled workforce so that Los Lunas remains an outstanding place to live, work and play.

Every year HR focuses on employee retention, ensuring that the Village is truly one of the best places to work. In 2024 our turnover rate was 13.1%, a slight increase from 2023 but still well under the industry average of 16 to 20%.

In addition, our vacancy rate has shown only a marginal increase from 3.2% in 2023 to 3.7% this year.

HR managed 50 recruitments for full and part-time work positions across all Village departments. Each summer, HR hires approximately 60 seasonal youth employees to work in our Summer Recreation Program and our Summer Youth Employment Program, providing valuable work experience to our local youth.

Employee well-being is a major component of the Human Resources Department.

HR works to ensure that our employees are well taken care of inside and outside the workplace. The Village offers a robust benefits package which is a leader among our peers.

This year the HR department took part in 13 job fairs throughout the region. HR staff also participated in several outreach events with Los Lunas Schools, performing mock interviews with students to prepare them for college entrance interviews and for entering the workforce.

HR also coordinates the Appreciate YOU program, which promotes employee enrichment and engagement, holding quarterly events for Village employees and their families.

The Village Council approved the continuation of the three-year progressive pay plan that was recommended by the 2023 compensation and classification study allowing the Village of Los Lunas to remain a leader among our peers for employee compensation.

In 2024 the Human Resources Department:

- Processed 1,081 job applications for Village job opportunities, a 45% increase from 2023. Our job postings were reviewed 32,417 times on our website, creating a conversion rate (views versus applications) which is well above the industry average of 1%.
- Continued phase two of the implementation of NEOGOV, a human resources information system (HRIS) software which connects the Village to government.com, a nationwide job search resource. This software has streamlined the HR process, better serving our external applicants as well as our internal systems, creating a higher, more efficient, level of service from HR.
- Completed the first full scale rewrite of the Village of Los Lunas personnel ordinance since 2007. The new personnel ordinance clarified and updated our personnel policies in line with the current work environment. The new ordinance was approved by the Village Council on Feb. 23, 2024.

SAFE WHILE WALKING

Summer mornings can be a perfect time to walk in the Village, but safety needs to be a prime consideration when walking any time of the year.

Walk on the sidewalk if there is one, say Los Lunas Police officers. If there is no sidewalk and you must walk on the road, be sure to walk facing traffic.

Be safe. Be seen. Brightly colored clothing makes it easier for drivers to see you during the daytime. At night, you need a flashlight or special reflective material on your shoes, cap, and jacket or on your arms or legs that bounce the car's lights off you and back to the driver.

This light should caution the driver that there is something or someone moving and they should slow down and be careful.

Remember that those coming down the street can't always see you!

WELLNESS COUNCIL FOCUSES ON PUBLIC HEALTH

The Community Wellness Council (CWC) is the designated health council of Valencia County. The CWC is the public health convener for community-based organizations and partners throughout Valencia County.

You will find out more about the health initiatives the CWC is currently supporting and can read more about the health priorities in the Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) available on the CWC website <https://communitywellnesscouncil.org/>.

The CWC began in 1993 as the Valencia County Coalition for Families, Children, and Community with a focus on building better futures for children and families.

It transitioned to the Valencia Community Partnership in 1999, shifting to health assessment and planning. In 2010, this organization reorganized to become the CWC.

Throughout its transitions, it has maintained its 501(c)(3) status, and an active leadership team committed to community wellness.

Health priorities in Valencia County are determined by combining epidemiological data with community feedback. The process involves ranking indicators and topics based on community burden, disease prevalence, and upstream indicators.

Community forums then categorize and rank these priorities through "dot voting." The top priorities are proposed to the CWC Executive Board for consideration, ensuring they reflect the community's voice and have the capacity to address them effectively.

The CWC Executive Board selects the top priorities for action planning, with the goal of addressing key issues and improving overall community health.
