LL FACEBOOK EXPANDING, RESTORING WATER

The Facebook Los Lunas Data Center is expanding by two new buildings.

Once completed, the nearly 3.8 million-square-foot data center will represent an investment of nearly \$2 billion and will support more than 400 operational jobs.

And Facebook officials have announced a new goal to restore 200% of the water the data center consumes into New Mexico watersheds.

To date, Facebook has invested in a total of five local water restoration projects. In 2020, these projects restored approximately 64 million gallons of water in New Mexico.

Through these projects, the Los Lunas Data Center already restores more water than it consumes. As Facebook grows, officials want to make sure the organization is doing its part to replenish New Mexico's water resources through partnerships with local environmental organizations.

Facebook is also partnering with Lokket and Valencia County to bring free Wi-Fi to up to 900 homes in the area.

A \$225,000 grant will be used to deploy and install hardware in homes throughout Valencia County and place distribution points on fire stations, schools, and other buildings.

Since 2017, Facebook has provided over \$2.3 million in grants and donations to local organizations.

Facebook will continue to invest in new wind and solar resources in the state, adding two new solar projects to the Facebook portfolio—a 190MW project in Valencia County and a 50MW project in Sandoval County. That brings the Facebook investment to 10 new renewable energy projects across six counties in New Mexico.

During construction, these projects supported 1,400 construction jobs and provided \$120 million in construction labor income.

Facebook officials say Los Lunas has been a terrific location for the data center since breaking ground five years ago.

During that time, the following has been accomplished - erected nearly 20,000 tons of steel, poured 126,792 cubic yards of concrete, recycled 88% of construction waste, and had 1,100 construction workers on site at peak.

Facebook officials express gratitude to the Village of Los Lunas, Valencia County, and the State of New Mexico, and all the community partners who have worked with Facebook.

The officials "look forward to a continued strong and fruitful partnership for years to come."

VILLAGE COUNCILORS ELECTED

The following were elected as Village of Los Lunas councilors at the Nov. 2, 2021, election: Christopher S. Ortiz, District One; Cruz Muñoz, District Three; and James T. Runyon, District Four.

GAMBOA, HUNING JOIN VILLAGE

Kristen Gamboa has joined the Village as Senior Economic Developer following the retirement of Ralph Mims, and Louis F. Huning Jr. is now Museum Specialist at the Village Museum of Heritage & Arts with the departure of Jan Micaletti.

Gamboa has plans to assist in general growth of the Village as pandemic-related restrictions lift across the state.

In an interview with the Valencia County News-Bulletin, Gamboa said she wants to grow the local economy through partnerships with nearby communities, such as Belen, Isleta Pueblo, Rio Communities, and even as far south as Socorro.

Huning is a history buff who is particularly interested in the Civil War as well as the Spanish Colonial Era in New Mexico.

His love of history comes from his family who settled in the area in the 1850s. Among Huning's tasks is planning the 2022 exhibits for the museum.

He looks forward to his work with the museum and the people involved with the museum.

Huning grew up in Los Lunas and has a degree from the University of New Mexico.

BALLOONS GLOW AT JUBILEE LOS LUNAS

BASKETBALL COURTS, I-25 INTERCHANGE ON PROJECTS LIST

Work continues on more than 60 projects in the Village of Los Lunas. There are several major projects including the I-25 Interchange/East-West Corridor. Other projects could be called minor such as basketball courts or signage.

The public may not always see projects. Examples are improving computer technology or the wastewater treatment plant.

The Village is not always responsible for projects such as the Courthouse Road and NM Hwy 314 realignment project (state), or miscellaneous fiber optic line installation projects (private companies).

Project funding comes from a variety of sources including loans, the Village budget, grants, and state funds. Several current projects were featured in the August and October 2021 Village Newsletter. Here are more:

- Park Improvements (construction starting soon)
 - New Basketball Court at Chester Skinner Park
 - New Basketball Court and Playground at Artistic Park
- Signs on new bridge over Rio Grande (aiming to be installed by end of 2021)
- I-25 Interchange / East-West Corridor — Design (approaching 60% design complete)
- New Water / Sewer Offices and Well 7 Arsenic Treatment Facility (being built at the same location)
- Huning Ranch Loop East Sewer Line Interceptor (approximately 85% complete).

WORKFORCE TRAINING CENTER NEARS COMPLETION

Construction of the University of New Mexico Valencia Workforce Training Center, located on Huning Ranch Loop East, is nearing completion.

The training center will offer classes and training focused on manufacturing and various industries, such as computer-assisted drafting and design, as well as general academics, like business writing classes.

Soft skills will be a large component of what is offered at the training center. It will also have the facilities to help companies with training.

Funding for the center was approved during the 2019 legislative session and then the legislation was signed by Governor Michelle Lujan Grisham.

The anticipated 18,000 square foot building is constructed on a nine-acre site donated to UNM-Valencia by Huning Partnership LLC.

UNM-Valencia Chief Executive Officer Alice Letteney said that the site is ideal because it is near an area of Los Lunas housing, manufacturing, and industrial businesses.

Letteney said one of the good things about the location is that programs can be taken to the businesses so that people learn in familiar surroundings.

The building will be one story with extensive landscaping on the site.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

This is another in a continuing series about departments in the Village of Los Lunas.

The Village Community Development Department includes the Planning Division, Economic Development Division, and Code Enforcement Division.

The department issues business registrations, building permits, animal licenses, and assists with the application and public hearing process for all zoning and subdivision applications.

The department also responds to complaints for animal control and code enforcement issues.

In addition, it supports economic development, long range planning, and ordinance updates, and spearheads the Los Lunas Roads Less Traveled □ tourism initiative.
